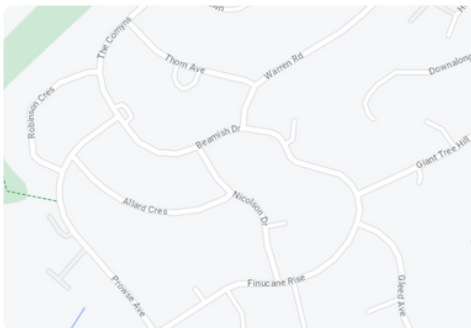

### BENTLEY PRIORY RESIDENTS

Around Stanmore, a number of roads are named after residents or historical figures connected to Bentley Priory over the site's 850 year history.

Can you find out a bit more about the people these roads are named after?

Match up the name to the description of the person!

<b>Glanville Mews</b> <i>Robert de Glanville</i>	Aunt to Queen Victoria, and once a Queen herself who lived and died at Bentley Priory
<b>Adelaide Close</b> <i>Queen Adelaide</i>	Commander-in-Chief at RAF Bentley Priory during the Battle of Britain
<b>Cranmer Close</b> <i>Thomas Cranmer</i>	Victorian businessman who set up a hotel at Bentley Priory
<b>Abercorn Road</b> <i>John James Hamilton, Earl of Abercorn</i>	Archbishop who sold Bentley Priory to King Henry VIII during the Reformation
<b>Dowding Place</b> <i>Air Chief Marshal Sir Hugh Dowding</i>	Probable founder of the 12th century Priory
<b>Gordon Avenue</b> <i>Frederick Gordon</i>	Nobleman who bought Bentley Priory in 1788 and lived there with his family for 30 years
